## WHAT IS IT

The Electoral College is a group
of 538 people who elect the President and Vice President.

Each state has a number of electors, equal to their seats in Congress. Candidates need a majority, or 270 votes, to win.

## THE PROBLEM

The Electoral College is an antiquated system created as a compromise to satisfy slaveholders that decreases voter turnout.

Additionally, 63\% of Americans
believe that the president should be elected by a direct popular vote.*

Since 1970, the League of Women Voters has believed that the Electoral College should be abolished in favor of a direct popular vote.

## The Problem

The Electoral College allows a candidate with fewer votes from the people to win the Presidency. This has happened five times in US history.2016

## The Solution

A direct, popular vote ensures that the candidate with the most votes from the people becomes President.

## The Problem

The Electoral College has been shown to decrease voter turnout because of its heavy emphasis on so-called "swing states" and the belief of voters in other states that their votes don't matter.

## The Solution

A direct, popular vote would increase voter turnout across the nation.

## ONE PERSON, ONE VOTE

## The Problem

No matter how many people live in a state, it gets two electoral votes based on its two senators. Votes from smaller states weigh more, violating the principle of
"one person, one vote."

$743,000 / 192,000=3.86$
Approx. 4 popular votes in FL = 1 popular vote in WY

## The Solution

A direct, popular vote ensures that one person gets one vote, no matter where you live.
